Children and Youth in our Churches.

How can we encourage children to learn about Jesus?


At the moment we have no definite guidelines on refreshments in Church but the plan has always been for September so we hope and pray our coffee mornings will recommence then.



Post Covid 19 Restriction Arrangements at Street, Walton & Compton Dundon

As you will know, the government have announced that most Covid 19 related restrictions in England will end on 19th July. However, this is in the context of rapidly rising case numbers in Somerset with both our government and the Church of England urging continued caution.

With the ending of the legal restrictions, the bullets below can now only be guidelines, but my hope is that we, as church family, will be able to adhere to these, as we support each other on this next phase of the journey out of the pandemic.

From 19th July, in all of our services in each of our churches, the following will apply:

- Whilst advanced **booking** for services will no longer be required, those on welcome (stewards etc) will be taking names (and contact details for any visitors), retaining them for 21 days for track and trace purposes.
- The wearing of **face coverings** will continue to be actively encouraged* whilst inside the building.
- The use of **hand sanitiser**, **ventilation** of buildings and **enhanced cleaning** will continue.
- Whilst **social distancing** is no longer a requirement, we will give people permission to socially distance if they wish by spreading out in pews and chairs. In Walton and Compton Dundon, people can put an item on the pew beside them to signify they wish to socially distance, whilst in the Parish and Mission Churches, the chairs will still be arranged two metres apart, with those who wish to move closer, being free to do so.
- Hugging, hand shaking, physical contact etc will be the personal decision of both parties. For the moment, we will not re-introduce this as part of the 'peace' as this may put pressure on individuals who remain uncomfortable with physical contact.

- **Singing** will be permitted, but with the congregation wearing face coverings (please see above*).
- **Communion** will remain in one kind for the time being, using the current system including the priest preparing the bread and wine.
- We will not re-start serving **refreshments** as yet and will encourage any pre and post service mingling to take place outside where possible.
- Those wishing to give financially via the **collection plate** should place their gift in the plate available when leaving the building.
- Users hiring our buildings are responsible for their own decisions and risk assessments, but enhanced cleaning will continue.
- Church groups (Little Stars, house groups etc) will be asked to consider what restrictions, if any, they will now relax, based on risk assessing their event or activity. I do not propose to encourage the various coffee mornings / afternoon teas indoors that we have not held during covid to re-start until September at the earliest.
- **Church Meetings** can be held indoors but adhering to the above where possible.

I am so aware that this may not seem like much will change in the short term, although the return of singing and the end of 'booking in' I hope will bring some joy and relief to many, but my sense is that there is widespread caution still, and I want people to feel safe in public worship.

As the current covid surge unfolds, I am conscious we need to keep these guidelines under constant review but do not want to change things too frequently so as to cause confusion. I am therefore proposing that we keep these in place for July and August, reviewing them again towards the end of August in time for September services. Ana Lawrence July 2021

Eco Church Update and Churchyards

Congratulations to Compton Dundon on achieving an Eco Church Bronze Award; well-deserved recognition of their commitment. Following on from all 4 Churches (3 parishes) having achieved Bronze Level an Action Plan to help us all work towards a higher Award has been agreed in principle by the PCCs. As with achieving the initial award, this will take time, we are continuing to tackle individual tasks. Our main focus at present, alongside calculating the Carbon Footprint of each church, is continuing with monthly plant and wildlife surveys in each churchyard throughout the summer.

As Christians, we believe that God is actively involved in creation, so it is important to understand how ecosystems work and how humans impact the world. One of the ways in which we can monitor our impact is by recording what is in our churchyards and planning how to manage them better ecologically. In 2014 a species of bat and six species of lichen were recorded in Compton Dundon churchyard, and in 2015 twenty different kinds of moss were identified in Holy Trinity churchyard, Street. How do I know this? Because it is recorded on a national database. Although nothing is recorded for Walton we hope to change that as there is much of interest there too. During Churches Count on

Nature week in June we were encouraged to record all aspects of the natural world in our Churchyards and Burial Grounds. Harriet Carty, Director of the conservation charity Caring for God's Acre, presented a webinar in which she explained the value of churchyards for biodiversity, due to their history over the centuries. Yew trees are often the most ancient feature, followed by walls which provide a habitat for plants, insects and birds. Compton Dundon has a yew tree that is amongst the oldest in the country

and the boundary walls of Street Parish Church show

the churchyard is of ancient origin because the rounded shape. Over 700 species of lichens have been recorded in churchyards, they are useful because they protect stonework.



Harriet explained why we need biological records, and how they link to national databases.



You don't have to be an expert to submit records and

I would encourage anyone to submit their sightings. You can do this through the website:- <u>https://www.caringforgodsacre.org.uk/</u> you need to say:

- Who the recorder's full name
- What the common (or scientific) name of the species you saw e.g. swift, ladybird, daisy
- Where the name, address and/or grid reference for the site you visited
- When the day, month and year

The form on the CGA website will guide you through the process; alternatively you can submit records to Caring for God's Acre by email or post.

WATCH – Give and be surprised

Our giving to missions and charities at Walton, for which I was responsible, had fallen into a bit of a rut - It had it fact got so bad that when Kevin asked me which organisations we supported, I wasn't even able to give a straight answer, because off the top of my head, I couldn't even recall them myself, I am ashamed to admit.

So, I was in truth quite relieved when he said he was forming a benefice-wide group to establish clear principles and bring some uniformity into how each church chose who it would support from year to year.

This has led to members of all three churches being invited to put forward ideas for the current year for their church to support.

It had been hoped that one organisation might have been named by all three parishes, but it was not to be. However, two were named by two out of the three: Tearfund and Open Doors. One on the Walton list that I had not heard of was "Railway Children" which rescues lost children from India's vast city railway stations from being abducted for purposes such as working as child labour in factories or in prostitution. Some of you may have seen the excellent film "Lion" which is about this. By chance I found a leaflet from Railway Children enclosed with a magazine just a few days before the PCC meeting. It is now one of the four chosen by Walton! The others were Tearfund, the well-known Christian international aid organisation, Open Doors which supports Christians persecuted for their faith, and One Hope Church in Harare, Zimbabwe, where my niece, Annie, works with kids living on the streets, which we in Walton have supported for a number of years now. My eye lighted on "Home for Good" in the list for Compton Dundon, which is doing a remarkable job with children in our broken social care system, and has identified some real areas of need in which churches could help - with training which they can supply. My request that Walton too might add them to our list was firmly ruled 'off limits' this time round – but there's always next year! Thank you, St Andrews, for this inspiring suggestion!

In June we had the Sound and Loop System serviced, the problems needing attention are being dealt with but generally microphones are working well, so any problems of not being able to hear should not be a technical one. For the sound to be heard, the user of the microphones must speak clearly and with reasonable volume and the sound box controller has a big part to play in getting the best from the microphones so all can hear clearly, including the hard of hearing of which I am one, if a hearing aid is used, switching to T on your aid is essential. SWCD CHURCHES CHARITABE GIVING FOR 2021

Over the last few weeks the PCC's for our three parishes have met to decide on which organisations to support through our charitable giving for 2021, following recommendations made by church family members. Each PCC had more recommendations than we could realistically support, so they are sorry that some suggested organisations were not selected for this year.

Do not look back

'REMEMBER LOT'S WIFE.' Luke 17:32 KJV

When the Sunday school teacher told her class, 'Lot's wife looked back and turned into a pillar of salt,' one child responded, 'That is nothin'! My mum was driving home yesterday, and she looked back and turned into a telephone pole!'

Lot's wife only appears briefly in one scripture, so why did Jesus tell us to remember her? Two reasons: 1. She invested her life in something that had no future. John writes, 'This world is fading away, along with everything it craves. But if you do the will of God, you will live forever' (1 John 2:17 NLT). God tried to get Lot's wife out of Sodom, but she couldn't get Sodom out of her. When she thought of what she was leaving, she looked back and turned into a lifeless monument. When God says it is time to move, do not hesitate! Do not become like those who once walked with him, witnessed on the job, stood out as shining lights in their communities, but now have turned cold and unresponsive.

2. Your decisions have consequences. If Lot's wife had kept moving forward she'd have been there to protect her daughters when they got to the cave. Instead they became victims of abuse and incest. Before you lose your children, poison your marriage, and tear up your life by refusing to break with your past, 'remember Lot's wife.' She did not make it to safety, but she did make it into scripture long enough to warn us about three things:

- complacency
- involvement with the wrong things
- a divided heart!
