Dear Friends,

New Vision for 2023 at SWCD Churches

Some eighteen months ago, all three of our PCC's gathered together at Bagley Baptist Church for a day of thinking, dreaming and sharing. At that day, we began to think about how we move forward as a benefice whilst recognising that each of our parishes and churches has and continues to maintain its own distinctive characteristics. Since then, I have been thinking and praying, as well as discussing with others and each of the PCC's, from which has emerged a new vision statement.

Moving towards a vision statement that we can adopt in all our parishes seeks to describe who we are and what we are aiming to do, if you like, it is an attempt to describe our DNA as a benefice. It gives us an overall direction of travel, against which we can review both current and planned future activities and events etc.

As 3 parishes, we should be characterised by our worship (gatherings on Sundays & at other times in the week), by the ways in which we seek to look outwards and reach our communities with God's love and by a desire to know God more fully, to grow in our discipleship as we grow in confidence to share our faith.

Reflecting the above, can I offer to you the following vision statement for our benefice:

"At SWCD Churches we are a church family who aims to:

Worship God, love our communities, grow in faith"

This can be summarised as:

Worship Love Grow How we work this out in what we do and say both as a benefice and in our individual parishes and churches will emerge over time but I hope this will give us a sense of the bedrock on which we collectively base all that we do.

Energy Audits on Street & Walton Churches

The following data and comments are a précis based on the energy audits carried out on our request by Green Journey, an organisation used by the Anglican Churches in their efforts to progress to a Carbon Zero state in Churches by 2030. Reports on each of the three Churches were commissioned and have been received. These reports contain details of energy usage by installed equipment, comments on the efficiency of this equipment and recommendations for future replacement. The reports also comment on possible reductions in energy usage by increased insulation of the buildings and heating installations, together with encouraging the more efficient use of the heating and lighting equipment.

The lighting in all three churches was considered energy inefficient, where possible LED bulbs should replace filament bulbs when replacement is required. Low voltage halogen and florescent lighting equipment to be replaced with LED equivalent lighting as they need replacement.

The heating and hot water boilers in the three churches are not of the most efficient latest designs. These should be replaced by more efficient modern equipment as they become unserviceable. The heating systems being adapted to use modern condensing boilers with the possible use of heat pumps as an alternative or an addition to augment the main system. In the Parish Church lagging of the boiler piping in the boiler room should be carried out as soon as possible.

Where ever possible all equipment being purchased should be of the most energy efficient design.

The windows in Street and Walton parish Churches cannot be replaced with double glazed units but could be fitted

with secondary double glazing. The Mission Church windows and doors can be gradually replaced with double glazing, especially the louvred windows which are excessively draughty.

In each of our churches a GREEN CHAMPION should be appointed, these could be a member of each church already a member of the benefice Eco-Church group. Their role would be to monitor their church's progress towards the Anglican Church's Net-Zero policy of zero carbon emissions by 2030. They would also implement action plans to ensure energy is not wasted in heating or overheating of little used areas and the switching off of lights when not required, also that the purchasing of equipment is in accordance with the above recommendations.

These are the basic recommendations of the reports, details of the consumptions of consumables are included in the reports and can be supplied on request.

Bishop's Letter

Are you looking out for Jesus?

In January, our churches enter the season of Epiphany which my dictionary defines as 'a moment of sudden and great revelation or realization'. I wonder what your epiphanies have been? When have you seen things for the first time? Experienced the penny dropping? Understood things in a new way?

In our churches, the readings for the Sundays of January are all about moments that revealed who Jesus is. The arrival of the wise men showed that Jesus is for everyone, not just the people of Israel. Jesus's baptism revealed his relationship with his Father and the Holy Spirit. The production at Cana of enough top-quality red plonk to take several baths in made clear the abundance of God's love for us. The end of the Epiphany season, the feast of Candlemas (actually 2 February), marks the moment when Jesus was seen as 'God's salvation for all peoples' (Luke 2: 31).

The challenge with epiphanies is whether we're looking out for them. If our eyes are wide shut, we don't see an awful lot. Sometimes we need to stand in a different place to spot things we haven't perceived before. So the question I'd like to ask you as our new year begins is 'Where and when are you looking out for the Jesus who has been revealed to us?'

A practical step you might take to help you on your way is to sign up to be part of the <u>'Everyday Faith' events</u> that will be happening around our diocese from 29 January until 4 February. The aim of these events is to help us look at our faith afresh and see things anew from some different perspectives.

I'm going to be taking part in the Everyday Faith events and they're going to be great. As we enter a new year, why not come and join me? After all, an invitation to an epiphany isn't something that comes your way every day!

Time to Clean House!

In Scotland they have a New Year's tradition that involves cleaning out your house, dumping the old ashes from your fireplace, and paying off your outstanding debts. It's about clearing out the old to make room for the new. And from time to time, you must clean your spiritual house too. The Bible says, 'Carry out the rubbish.' Why? Because over time wrong attitudes, shoddy workmanship, and bad habits creep in and blind us to what's important.

Sheila Coleman says: 'Ten years ago I cleaned house from top to bottom. I dusted every nook and cranny ... scrubbed the bath and every sink until they shone. I even took a toothbrush to the grout in the kitchen. That house had never been so clean. And today – ten years later ... it's still clean. I've never had to pick up another duster ... vacuum ... or wash the kitchen counter ... and my house looks as clean as it did that day, right? WRONG! We continually need spiritual house cleaning because we live in a dirty world. Just as our homes ... cars and clothes have to be maintained ... our hearts – our spiritual homes – need to be cleaned on a regular basis. Not once a week or once a month, and certainly not once every ten years, or once in a lifetime. We need to let God have His way in us every day, to clean us up and renew us ... Is there a room in your "house" you haven't allowed Him to clean?


If it's been a while since God did a thorough heart-cleaning, make this your prayer: *Lord clean my heart so You can live and shine through me.*'
