### **Rector's Letter**

"Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her" Luke Chapter 10 verse 42

Dear Friends,

This is the season of summer camps & conferences, and over the coming weeks many thousands of Christians will be gathering to worship and deepen their Christian faith whether in big tops or other such venues. I myself have been and continue to attend such events as part of my own discipleship and pattern of worship and I know some of you have also enjoyed Christian festivals.

Whilst the focus at such an event may be to go deeper with God, to worship him and to enjoy his presence – we can of course do this anywhere!

I love the story of Martha and Mary, from which the above verse comes. A story of two sisters who welcomed Jesus, their close friend into their home. Martha was anxious, busy and distracted as the hostess and somewhat affronted that no-one else was helping! Mary, on the other hand was sitting at Jesus' feet, listening, worshipping, learning and growing. Jesus pointed out to Martha that Mary on this occasion had made the better choice. This was not the time for being domestic and busy, the focus instead was to be on Jesus, listening to and learning from him.

There is of course a place for both 'being' and 'doing' neither of which are mutually exclusive, and I wonder whether sometimes we are more comfortable in being busy, running errands, baking a cake for a church event rather than coming to a bible study, Christian conference or even a prayer meeting.

Maybe we need to consider our priorities knowing that we can listen to Jesus and worship him anywhere – though it is good, if we are able, to come alongside our brothers and sisters in church and elsewhere.

Jesus had deep affection for Martha, calling her name twice "Martha, Martha" and we know that even if on this occasion she had slightly missed the point, she is still a loved disciple, still a friend of Jesus within his close inner circle.

Where are you on this – do you need to hear that affectionate voice of the Lord calling your name twice – do you need to spend more time at the feet of Jesus?

### Bishop's letter

I'm new around here. Following retirement from ordained ministry last year Somerset has become my adopted county and Bath and Wells my adopted diocese. Sally and I are delighted to be full time now in this lovely and



stimulating area. We join many of you who have been part of this diocese and county for a lifetime or for decades, and also some who have recently arrived like us. We have chosen to be here. Others arrive here because of a range of circumstances and decisions. Perhaps sometimes the journey seems haphazard or inexplicable. Some people come here as refugees fleeing persecution, injustice, or war, especially from Syria, Afghanistan and Ukraine. They arrive with uncertainty, and often anxiety or trepidation in an unknown and entirely new place far from home. In our churches and Christian communities, we are committed to welcome everyone - those settled here and also those who are newer. We know we are sisters and brothers in God's family, regardless of background, nationality or indeed any other thing which distinguishes us. God's family is the family of humankind. It's not that we pick and choose whom to call family; we share the same flesh and blood. St Paul tells us that each one of us has been adopted into that family which is divine and human. God sent Jesus "so that we might receive adoption as children" enabling us to be gifted with the Holy Spirit. (Galatians 4:4-7) We don't belong out of personal choice, in contrast to my decision to chose here as my adopted diocese and community. We don't pick and choose our ultimate citizenship. God chooses and calls us without us desiring or deserving such adoption. That's why, following God's adoption of us, we never select who to welcome into our church or parish. All belong and all are welcome without hesitation. We have been adopted into God's family and we are thrilled to adopt everyone into our communities. Thank you for welcoming me! +Christopher Foster (Honorary Assistant Bishop Bath and Wells).

### **Praying for The Ukraine**

On February 24<sup>th</sup> at 5 am, nearly 5 months ago, Putin began his 'military operation' in Kyiv.

By July 15<sup>th</sup>, as I write now, there have been 5,024 civilian casualties, including 343 children.

A further 6,520 have been injured (United Nations statistics.)

Furthermore, 10 million people have left their homes and we are facing the largest refugee crisis in Europe since the Second World War.

In St Andrew's Church last month we paused to reflect on the escalating situation in The Ukraine and all whom it affects. The congregation were invited to place a candle on the map of Ukraine as a symbol of our love and support for this nation. It was both humbling and moving to be able to remember them in this way.

Our intercessions included this beautiful prayer that I saw on the wall in All Saints Church, Castle Cary:

# A prayer for Ukraine and all the troubled places of this beautiful, broken world

God of peace, justice, and mercy; we pray for the people of Ukraine, Yemen, Afghanistan, Syria and all the hurting places in the world. Empower those who seek peace and the laying down of weapons.

Comfort and come near to those who fear for tomorrow.

Give wisdom, discernment, and compassion to those with power over war or peace.

Enfold and protect all your precious children, at risk and in fear,

holding them in your loving arms.

We pray this in the name of Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

### FINANCIAL UPDATE

As more figures become available we wanted to share an update on 'where we are' on our benefice finances.

### Firstly, three bits of good news

We are seeing the impact on our finances of those who have responded to the recent stewardship campaign by increasing their giving, with regular giving having risen across all our parishes.

The installation of solar panels at the Mission Church, thanks to an anonymous donation, means we are likely to see a reduction in our use of electricity from external providers and, indeed, some income as we 'sell' surplus energy to the national grid.

Walton and Compton Dundon had successful fundraising activities associated with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations.

### But then, sadly, three pieces of bad news

Although giving is up, we are still running at a deficit in all our parishes. Giving has not yet increased enough to cover our costs.

Like many others, our churches are being 'hit' by the cost-ofliving crisis, with rapidly rising charges for heat and light, for example.

As a result, we are still having to draw on our reserves, which are consequently still reducing.

### Three things our PCC's are doing

Street have reviewed the fees for hiring our buildings, increasing them for the first time for a number of years. Whilst we don't want to drive users away, we must recognise the increased costs of using the buildings.

Walton and Compton Dundon are planning further fundraising events.

All our parishes are actively looking at offering online giving options and providing contactless giving terminals in our churches for both church family and visitors to make donations.

### Three things you can do

Pray, for the finances of our benefice

Consider, if you have not already done so, increasing your regular giving or making a one off donation to the life and ministry of your parish.

Gift aid your donations if you are able and have not already done so. This increases the value of your gift to the church by 25% with no cost to you.

'ANGELS ARE ... SPIRITS SENT FROM GOD TO CARE FOR THOSE WHO WILL RECEIVE SALVATION.' HEBREWS 1:14 NLT

Some of us struggle with the idea of angels watching over us. And what is the result? Listen: 'Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for some who have done this have entertained angels without realizing it!' (Hebrews 13:2 NLT). Is it possible you have missed them?

'Tell me again what angels are supposed to do,' you say. Okay, but keep an open mind; you are about to come into a new awareness!

- a) Angels are God's protective detail watching over you constantly. Your early cancer detection! That narrow escape! Those were more than just lucky breaks. Listen: 'He orders His angels to protect you wherever you go' (Psalm 91:11 NLT).
- b) Special angels are assigned to watch over our children. Now you know why kids survive things that make parents go weak at the knees. Listen: 'do not despise a single one of these little ones. For I tell you that in heaven their angels are always in the presence of My heavenly Father' (Matthew 18:10 NLT).

An angel went before Israel's army guaranteeing their victory. An angel shut the mouths of the lions for Daniel. An angel opened prison doors for Peter, saving his life on the eve of his execution. An angel showed up in a storm to let Paul know that he would be okay.

So, did God suddenly do away with His Secret Service Department? Are they drawing unemployment benefit somewhere in heaven? No, they are still on the job. We just need to become wise enough and humble enough to acknowledge them.
