Dear Friends,

“By God’s grace, I will seek to set aside time for prayer, worship and spiritual reading..” (Rhythms of Grace).

A few years ago, I remember going along to my GP surgery for a ‘well woman’ check. I wasn’t sure what to expect or how I’d ‘do’. Thankfully, all seemed to be in order other than my physical exercise level which registered as ‘moderately inactive’. At the time, I was a theological student spending many hours sitting and studying and with this new piece of information, I was keen to redress the balance in order that I didn’t become an unhealthy couch potato and so introduced more physical exercise into my daily routine.

Every year, for those of us who drive cars, we take our cars in for an MOT to check they are still roadworthy and to identify any issues that need attending to, and like myself, many of us will have a health check-up too, to see if we have any physical problems which need attention.

But what about our spiritual health? How often do we stop and review how we are doing as a follower of Jesus?

Here are a few questions to ponder:

Are we expecting to be changed and transformed to become more like Jesus? Are we open to the presence and power of the Holy Spirit? Can we set aside time for prayer, worship and spiritual reading? Are we a gracious presence in the world, serving others and working for justice in human relationships? Can we share our faith sensitively with others supporting God’s mission both locally and globally?

If this list of questions leaves you reeling and challenged, don't worry. As we enter the summer months, this can be a great opportunity to take some time to pause, reflect and consider how we are doing and to prayerfully make some changes if things are not all as they might be.

Thankfully, it is the Holy Spirit who brings about the changes in our lives if we are willing to allow him to do so.

The last line of the well-known hymn perhaps expresses this succinctly "changed from glory into glory, till in heaven we take our place..."

Bishop's Letter

What a joy!

'In response to God's immense love for us we seek to be God's people living and telling the story of Jesus.' In conversations with people from around the diocese about our vision in recent months, we have talked of all the different ways that we can serve the communities in which we are based - how we can enable the life of the whole of the people of God.

One of the community connections that many of our churches nurture is with their local school, in particular with our church schools where day in, day out teachers and their support staff reflect God's love and teachings with the pupils in their care. As rewarding as that role is, it is a tough one. The long summer holiday may be in sight but anyone who knows a teacher or member of school staff will tell you how much that is needed as well as how much work is done during that 'break'. They truly need our support and love and prayers. We should also give thanks for those working in our schools during the summer, cleaning, building, or preparing for the new academic year. Not all of us are blessed with the gifts to teach, but many of us have other gifts that can help our school communities. For some it is the gift of storytelling, sharing the teachings of Jesus as an Open the Book volunteer, others serve as chaplains. Some will simply live out their Christian faith by volunteering in classrooms or in the playground or by praying regularly for the school community. All of these roles are valuable to our schools, and rewarding for those who fulfil them.

What our schools and Academy Trusts need in particular are governors and trustees. There are many opportunities, especially for foundation governors and trustees who have a distinct responsibility for championing the Christian character of our schools. That may sound daunting, but that responsibility isn't held alone as there is support locally and from our excellent diocesan education team. And if you do take on that role, what a

joy to know that you are playing your part to support and nurture our young people in the way of our Lord who said, “I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth.”

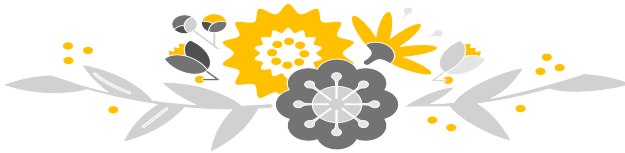


We are having a quiet July as we cancelled our garage sale so that we could support the WI at their fundraising event due the same day. It gives us a chance to draw breath and relax.

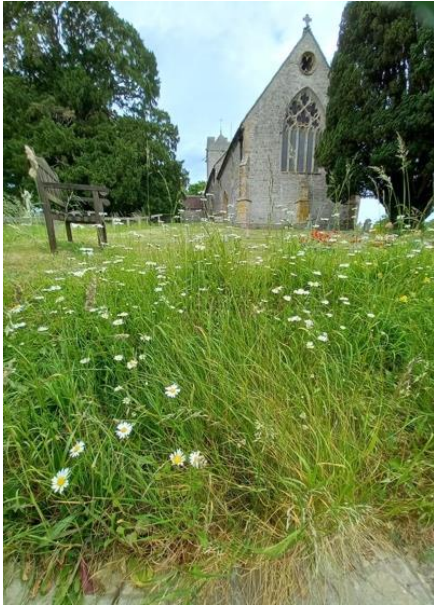

All things botanical in Compton Dundon

As good stewards of God's creation and as part of Somerset's 'Wilder Churches' initiative we have chosen a few areas in the churchyard to allow the grass and wildflowers to flourish.

Thank you to the Eco Church team for initiating this project.



This month (June) a group of us met to evaluate the progress of these wilder areas and we were pleased to see a variety of wildflowers, including orchids and foxgloves. Bees were clearly enjoying the colourful flowers, as were several varieties of butterflies.

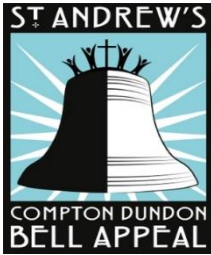
Angela gave us food for thought by talking about all of us doing God's work every day, even though this may not be in paid employment.

Caring for God's Acre

As you will see from this month's cover all four churches have been managing their church 'yards' in a wildlife friendly way.

In last month's magazine I referred to 3 Churchyard events; two of these have now happened. Churchyards are about many things, appropriately managed they can provide a haven for wild plants, flowers and creatures. Graves connect us to the past, our own families or other people's; they tell their own story. Both these aspects were reflected in the event at Street Parish Church. Some took a tour of the churchyard to look at the existing wild areas, plants were examined and ideas for further work discussed. Another person embarked on detective work to find two graves referred to on a sign near the gate linking them to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. They were not easy to find as they are not standard CWGC headstones. With the help of some of those present the graves were identified and a transcript of the original inscriptions found.

Walton held a Family Fun day. The Eco Church group provided a quiz encouraging participants to look more carefully at the plants and other wildlife on the site. Sitting at an outside stall I saw blackbirds, jackdaws, swallows, chaffinches and heard goldfinches, blackcaps and chiffchaffs singing; a young jackdaw landed briefly on my hand. Some of us inspected the un-mown areas and identified a number of the wild flowers growing there.

At both events participants were encouraged to record their own wildlife sightings, they do not have to be unusual, it is just as important to record 'everyday' species. Please do record what you see in our churchyards, you can find information on how to do this on the Caring for God's Acre website: <https://www.caringforgodsacre.org.uk/about-recording/>

In the meantime, we have two pieces of news to share.

Firstly, each of our PCC's agreed that, as a benefice, we should support the Diocese of Bath and Wells Zambia link this year and specifically the link parish of Mfuwe, in Eastern Province with whom Street have already had a long-term partnership. As part of this support we would love to organise a benefice trip to Zambia, possibly in June 2024, with a chance to meet with our brothers and sisters in the church there and get involved in their life and ministry. Mfuwe parish is also at the centre of one of Africa's finest game parks and so there may well be opportunities to go on safari as well! Ana and I have visited Zambia on a number of occasions, including leading several groups to visit local communities, and we would love the opportunity to take a group from SWCD churches. If this is something that you would be interested in, as a first step, could you register that initial interest with either Ana & I so we can judge whether a trip would be viable.

Meanwhile, we are in regular contact with the parish priest at Mfuwe, Father Samson Mwanza, and I wanted to share an extract from his latest WhatsApp message:

Greetings to you and the entire parish. We are continuing praying for you and we trust that you are remembering us in your prayers,

Secondly, in order that we can give each of the charities that we will be supporting in 2023 as much profile as possible we are also looking for 'champions' for each charity in each of our parishes. The role would involve being the first point of contact with our supported charity, sharing information either via 'Life' or on designated Sundays etc. If this is something that you would be interested in getting involved in, please also get in touch.

Despite the financial challenges that we as a church and society are facing, it is good that we continue to offer financial and prayer support to others both locally and around the world where there is need,

WATCH – wearing your new outfit?

It has been a mystery to me for years. Jesus promised us new life. 'If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation: the old things have passed away.' (2 Corinthians 5:17).

'The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control' (Galatians 5:22).

But – and it's a big BUT – I don't see too much of this in my day-to-day life as a follower of Christ. Am I fooling myself? Are these just nice-sounding words? Does it really matter? Yes, I think it does matter very much. Because if it's just empty words, then what we say we believe is just so much hot air, and we are a bunch of hypocrites. We deserve to be justifiably condemned, to be pitied perhaps for fooling ourselves. How can we resolve this? Is there a way of making sense of it, of making it real and credible?

I am only now coming to see that I may have been looking at it all these years with 'pie-eyed' vision! I've put all the responsibility on God – failing to see how it depends on me to put into practice what God has provided. He has given me the tools and the power but I need to get plugged in and get to work on it. In John's Gospel Chapter 1 verse 12, we read 'To those who believe He gives the power to become children of God.' Notice those words 'power to become'. To me this implies it's not automatic. We have to do something. God gives us the power – His Holy Spirit – when we are born again, putting our faith in Christ and becoming His disciples – we need to make use of that power by asking each day to be filled with the Holy Spirit: which our Heavenly Father longs for us to have, just as we long to give our children (and grandchildren!) good gifts.

Then we must consciously study and think about how we can apply it in our everyday life and relationships. Unless we do that, our 'new life' will remain just words: words which we profess to believe but actually our lives show that it is just a sham.

Jesus' strongest and most withering criticism was reserved for those who claimed to be religious and closest to God. There's no room for kidding ourselves here. Let's face it: we are probably the ones seen by others as the most religious people around today. Do they see us as distinctively different, overflowing with love, joy, peace, humility and self-control? Are we 'salt' and 'light' in our families, our schools, our places of work, our neighbourhoods? I for one need to do a lot of soul-searching here. I need to do a lot of catch-up homework so that I can be sure I am 'walking the talk' and not letting Team Jesus down.

Hopefully the result will be that we can all play together as one with the help of the Holy Spirit and begin scoring goals for God. The possibilities are boundless if we listen to our coach and follow His instructions.
