Rector's Letter

“One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts” Psalm chapter 145 verse 4

Dear Friends,

On 6th August, we needed just about all the chairs in the Parish Church at our Sunday morning communion service as the regular church family were joined by friends and family of Jack, Charles and Evie as they were baptised. It was noisy, a little chaotic and perhaps not what everyone was used to on a Sunday morning, but it was wonderful to worship together from across the generations and a privilege to offer prayer to so many who may not normally have been seen inside of a church on a Sunday morning.

This might be the kind of service the Psalmist was remembering as he wrote the words above. Bishops Letter

Learn from the Master

When you hear the word 'disciple', what comes into your mind? A learner? A follower? A super Christian? Someone kitted out in Biblical dress complete with robe, sandals, tea towel head covering and beard?

The New Testament's word for disciple doesn't quite match any of these descriptions. It's much closer to the word we'd use in English for 'apprentice'.

Back in history, and still today, to be an apprentice meant spending time in the presence of a master in order to learn a craft – maybe carpentry, or blacksmithing, baking or butchery. You'd start out doing the simple stuff – sweeping floors or sharpening tools. Then gradually you'd acquire more and more skills until you learnt to work confidently with materials producing beautiful things, products of utility and worth. Apprentices often learnt their craft while living alongside their masters, becoming members of their trade through time spent together at work and rest and play.

Jesus was often called 'the carpenter's son' – apprenticed to his worldly father Joseph, growing in skill at the plane and the lathe. He was also the apprentice of his heavenly father. The Gospels speak of Jesus withdrawing to spend time with God in order to know God's mind, hear God's voice, grow in God's ways.

Apprenticeship was and is a story of growth, development, discovery and change. It's the journey that Jesus invites us to take with him too – of baby steps and toddler stumbles, of emerging skill and increasing understanding.

Churches near you are offering opportunities to apprentice yourself to Jesus this autumn - from practical action that gets you

involved in Jesus's service to the world, to learning and discussion that comes with courses such as Alpha, Exploring Christianity or Pilgrim.

Why not sign yourself up and learn from the Master?

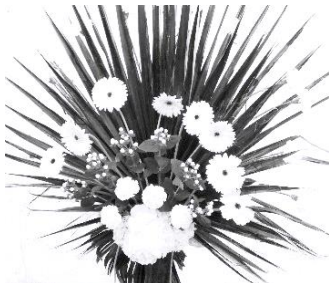


Our Harvest festival service will be on the 1st October and, as usual, your

UPDATE – BENEFICE FINANCES

As we promised, we are writing to keep you up to date on the state of our benefice wide finances, based on figures we now have for the first six months of 2023.

The good news is that, across our 3 parishes income is rising, partly because new church members are giving and some existing church members have increased their giving, but also because of increased income from hiring out our buildings (in Street) and receipt of more fees for weddings and funerals

However, costs at our churches are also increasing, as they are for many other Individuals and organisations, particularly utilities, insurance and other bills that we must pay to maintain our buildings and ministry. The net result, the figures tell us, is that, across the benefice, we are still in deficit; in other words we are spending more than we are receiving and any reserves we have are being further depleted.

The detailed situation in each parish is a little different and please talk to your own Church Treasurer (details in this magazine) if you want to see the actual figures for your parish.

As we have said before, the reality is, that it is up to us as a church family to 'pay our way.' Income from hiring at our building, 'occasional office' fees and applications for grants for certain things are useful sources of money, but most of our income will continue to come from the generous giving of individuals.

We have also written previously about various ways you can make your giving go further including standing orders, Gift Aid, EasyFundraising etc, Now, on our church website, you can find all these options in one place for each parish with the forms etc you need for each. If you do not have internet access or you

My Faith Journey

My journey in faith began when I was four years old when our next-door neighbours took me to Sunday School at the Methodist church on Sunday afternoons. We progressed to the Anglican church when my brother became a server and my sister and I joined the choir. We were led by the very enthusiastic vicar's wife and she became an influential part of my faith journey. It was at this age that I first met David aged just 10 years old.

A new vicar brought about a new phase of my faith journey, a younger outlook and so began a very special part of my life. In 1980 David and I married at the church where our faith grew. We started our married life in Bristol. David became a lay reader.

It wasn't really until we moved to Cornwall that my faith really grew and I began a rich rewarding walk with Jesus. Until that time, I would say I was a Christian but realised I did not have that special relationship. We became part of a lively, evangelical Anglican church in our village where my spiritual life changed. I was part of a Lydia group for women, Bible study with other ladies, leading a house group in our own home and to my utmost amazement I became a part of a sacred dance group. It was through this that I met the living God, who ministered to me in my busy life as a mum to three small children. To dance in the Spirit was absolutely incredible. We met weekly, praying and dancing very much in the spirit. Even now certain songs bring back those special worship movements.

When David was ordained to the ministry as a worker priest we moved to another benefice although I did keep the dancing going! It was here that I was again involved in children's ministry.

A promotion to a bigger headship for David led us to Somerset and to the Mission church with our extended family, including our two mums. I qualified as a primary school teacher where religious

education was my subject area. I was deeply aware of the importance of Christian teachers in our schools. Children's work is at the heart of what I call my ministry. I lead the local Open the Book Team, am an active member of the Messy Church Team

and was a school governor up until recently with a real heart for the Christian message in our schools. My faith journey continues everyday through praying and sitting in the presence of our Lord as well as being out there amongst the people I meet every day. I believe my life is a witness and encouragement to others. I continue to grow in faith and sometimes even dance!

The Season of Creation

From 1st September to 4th October each year, Christian communities around the world celebrate the Season of Creation. This is an opportunity to unite in praying and responding together to the cry of Creation.

This year's theme Let Justice and Peace Flow is taken from Amos 5:24: 'But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!' Pilgrimage, in life we are all on a spiritual journey.

For me the journey to Scotland for this summer did not so much start with a sense of dissatisfaction with life in Street, but the sense that there was a reason for exploration of our lovely British Isles. I had a volunteer opportunity to spend a rent-free August on a small island off Skye, so I grabbed it. I felt though the destination was important I needed to enjoy the journey through the UK and not just go for a driving marathon.

I had recently seen the film 'The unexpected Pilgrimage of Harold Fry' which apart from telling me it was not a good idea to head out from Kingsbridge to post a letter and end up in Berwick on Tweed! The film planted the question of pilgrimage, and what pilgrimage is?

I felt having an end date to return home was important, and looking through my diary I found our listening course is due to start on Tuesday 12 September, I feel very excited by this opportunity to learn some more skills to show people how valued they are to both God and ourselves, and show this respect by truly listening to what they are saying. So, the 11th became my date of return to Street.

So the next challenge, how to plan the route but leave space to catch up with friends and for the joy of the unexpected on the journey. Firstly I booked two 4 day retreats. On the way up (going by Berwick on Tweed) that was on the Holy Isle of Lindesfarne. For some lovely spiritual input by the Rev Sarah, in morning and evening prayer in the church, and sharing with an American Bible collage lecturer at meal times. On the way down it will be at Scargill (a Christian conference centre similar but smaller than Lee Abbey) with the interesting title of 'For your age' about how to age well!

What about reading material for my daily times with God? I have recently come across some bible study books called Copy Bible; I chose 2. The book of Ester (A great story) and 2 Timothy, in these you copy down the bible passage then have a blank page for your own drawings and thoughts, helping me to meditate on its meaning.

I have two reading books with me. One I highly recommend 'Soulful Nature' by Brian Draper and H. Green a botanist and a theologian, where you read one chapter a month and have a list of gentle spiritual exercises to try that month. The forward is by Alan Titchmarsh and Clare Balding so it is a very accessible book. May be in 2024 a few of us could read it together meeting once a month?

The other an older book (1999) lent to be by Vera called, the Journey - a Pilgrim in the lands of the Spirit by Alister Mc Grath.

So the journey began. Two unexpected joys, on a whim following a sign saying 'Wildlife Centre Loch of the Lowes I found I was able to watch a young Osprey, whose brother had already flown, crying for food on its nest and then taking the risk and making a short flight. Then Driving up the A9 near Dalwhinnie, seeing an enormous bird flying up towards me and realising it was a Golden Eagle. This brought to mind that lovely verse from Isaiah 40:31 "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings of eagles..."

As I write this I am on a tiny island off Skye and still very much enjoying the journey and conscious of God's presence with me.

A lifelong journey

As Christians we're not called to attend church, we're called to follow Christ, to be His disciples. But how do we respond to that call? And how is your relationship with Christ?

Cheryl Govier, Growing Faith Adviser for Bath and Wells says, "As Christians, we are all on a journey and it is really important that we grow as Christians as we journey with God. As with any journey, and any relationship, sometimes it can feel that things are going really well, while sometimes it can feel static or even as if it's going backwards."

With so many demands on our time, in church and outside church, our discipleship can be a bit neglected, but we can all learn to make time to reflect on our faith as we live out our daily lives. In the last few years people from across Bath and Wells have gathered together at our Everyday Faith events to do just that - and we have also gathered to celebrate with those marking personal landmarks in their journeys with Christ, both lay and ordained. David Ball of the Gold Project, one of the resources we signpost in Bath and Wells to support discipleship, attended the Celebration of Lay Ministries in June, he says, "We want to encourage all Christians, not just those on the path to theological college, to become life-long learners and to encourage people in their discipleship. Discipleship doesn't stop when you become a Christian, it keeps going your whole life. Many people worry that they aren't equipped to engage with the Bible, but we all can. Yes, it may raise difficult questions, but we shouldn't be afraid of addressing them, especially as we aren't doing so alone."

What you sow, you reap

‘LET US NOT BECOME WEARY IN DOING GOOD ... WE WILL REAP A HARVEST IF WE DO NOT GIVE UP.’ Galatians 6:9 NIV

The name Corrie ten Boom is widely recognised in Christian circles, but few people know about her nephew Peter who was also instrumental in saving Jews from Nazi persecution. When Dutch patriots heard SS troops were sending Jewish orphans to concentration camps, they smuggled kids out of orphanages and brought them to the ten Boom house until they could be placed for adoption. At sixteen, Peter, a committed Christian, defied the Germans by pulling out all the stops on the church organ and playing the Dutch national anthem while the congregation stood up and sang. He was imprisoned for his defiance.

After World War II he travelled the world with the same message as his aunt; that forgiveness is the only answer to hatred. On tour in Israel Peter had a heart attack and needed surgery. Talking with him the night before his operation the cardiologist asked, 'Are you by any chance related to the ten Booms of Holland?' Peter replied, 'Yes, that's my family.' The doctor responded, 'I'm one of the babies your family saved!' Next day the man whose life had been saved forty years earlier, repaid the debt by saving Peter ten Boom's life.

The Bible says when you, 'Cast your bread upon the waters ... after many days you will find it again' (Ecclesiastes 11:1 NIV). What you sow – good or bad – comes back to you. So, 'Let us not become weary in doing good ... at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.'

Remember, God is no man's debtor, and no matter how long it takes He will honour His Word.
