Rectors Letter

Dear Friends,

"..brothers and sisters, we instructed you how to live in order to please God.." 1 Thessalonians chapter 4 verse 1

During the early part of the Summer, our Sunday morning sermons were on the theme of godly relationships. At the outset, we established that our primary relationship as Christians is with God, our loving heavenly Father.

Yet, amidst the pressures of daily life and the many relationships we may have to navigate, whether family, neighbours, friends and beyond, sometimes our relationship with God can be less than it should be, and we don't give God the priority that we should give him. The blunt question is, is Jesus the centre of our lives and are our lives pleasing to him?

In my own life, I have been conscious of many times when I have sought to please others, perhaps through what I achieve and what I can offer. Some people are very good at 'people pleasing', wanting to be all things to all people, never saying no, nor letting anyone down. Sadly, this simply isn't possible and the danger for people pleasers is that they will become 'door mats' always available when others demand. God is not asking us to be like that. Our priority should rather be to please God in the way we live our lives, the way we treat others and the way we use our resources.

The verse quoted above begins a chapter which unpacks how to live a life that pleases God. It's a challenging read but one we need to wrestle with as we seek to re-focus our priorities. The Summer weeks can often be (if not necessarily for everyone) a time when things slow down, demands on us are fewer and we can step back from the ordinary every day. This Summer could that time and space be an opportunity to refocus our priorities?

Enjoy your Summer whatever it looks like for you. With my love & prayers, Ana

It's August! Does that mean holiday season for you? Of course, it will be for some...but where and doing what?

Holidays mean all sorts of different places and activities – sometimes inactivity - and our preferences and choices are hugely diverse. Take a break this summer, whether or not you leave home, to regain your perspective on the beauty and privilege of being a follower of Jesus in bringing the Kingdom a little closer. See the opportunities as well as the challenges in your community, our nation, and the world. Looking more widely and more broadly gives a proper perspective on who we in the divine economy, and how we can serve both God and also other people.

New arrangements for Communion

At the moment, in our Communion services both on Sundays and midweek, we offer bread (as a wafer) and alcoholic wine.

From September, I would like to introduce the option of non-alcoholic wine in all our communion services which will be available to those who would prefer this alongside our current provision. I also want to flag up that we have gluten free wafers for any who need these, and we will ensure that these are also available at our services.

If you would rather not receive wine at all, to receive only the bread is a perfectly acceptable way of receiving communion.

I hope these new arrangements will work for everyone but if there are particular issues, please do have a word with one of the clergy team.

If you want to receive non-alcoholic wine or gluten free wafers, it would be really helpful if you could let either the priest officiating or the warden on duty know. Ana Lawrence

A Celebration of Lay Ministries

On Saturday, June 22nd there was a Celebration of Lay Ministries in St Paul's Church, Weston-Super-Mare. It was attended by some of those who play a lay role in church life, including lay pastoral assistants, lay worship assistants, lay readers, Pioneers and honorary Chaplains.

The Celebration began with a Church service, followed by an opportunity to browse the stalls set up in the adjacent Church Hall.

I had decided to go to this service with Jan Jones, a lay reader in our Deanery.

We travelled to Weston early enough to enjoy our packed lunch and an ice cream on the seafront! St Paul's Church is a short walk from the beach and on arrival we were surprised to see this large town church absolutely filled with many others involved in lay ministry in its many forms. The theme for the service was Harmony and at one point we were invited to write a word or draw a picture representing this word. These were collected and collated into a 'Wordle' of many ideas, including musical harmony, world peace harmony and Christian harmony.

Different ministries and gifts in the Diocese were recognised and some interesting examples were shared. Powerful testimony was given by representatives from the Christian Motorcyclists' Association and the Mission to Seafarers. These people are constantly reaching out to those of firm faith and those of no faith, meeting them on common ground and experience to share God's word in their own context.

Another encouraging insight was offered through filmed interviews with Pupil Chaplaincy Teams in Somerset schools, who were shining examples of spreading the good news to their peers in their school settings, as well as carrying out community projects.

Bishop Michael's words affirmed that we all have ministries and gifts to offer and everyone is valued. Being together and working

together in unity, we can create harmony. The Service concluded with a Blessing from the Bishop.

Jan and I agreed that it had been a worthwhile experience, not least to hear the many diverse ways in which lay ministry makes a real difference.
