

Rector's Letter

Dear Friends,

'God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble'

The most recent conflict in the Middle East has now been raging for over a year, with countless lives lost, mass destruction and fear. Closer to home, the war in Ukraine seems to be unending. As I write, new allegations have emerged about widespread foreign interference in UK political life. We live in turbulent and troubled times.

In church and elsewhere, we continue to pray prayers of peace for so many troubled parts of the world. Yet, even as we pray, some of you might be thinking 'when will this all end?' We don't know, but as Christians, we put our trust in God who is indeed our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Likewise, some of us may be facing turbulent waters in our own families, friendship groups or at home. Just in the last few days, Kevin and I heard from close friends about their devastating news. Whether illness, bereavement, unexpected news or something else, my prayer is that we will know that God is mightier than even the bloodiest war-zone, even the most awful news, even in situations when we are tempted to just give up praying because there seems no point.

And this month, in the context of the above, we take time pray and remember, at our annual remembrance services, as we call to mind the turmoil of war and tragedy of those who lost their lives in the many conflicts.

As we look back with gratitude and prayerfulness, let us also look forward to the future with the knowledge that God is the God of

hope who can satisfy our deepest longings and bring us everlasting peace. I am sharing a verse from the popular modern hymn 'In Christ alone'

In Christ alone my hope is found He is my light my strength my song. This cornerstone this solid ground firm through the fiercest drought and storm. What heights of love what depths of peace when fears are stilled when strivings cease. My comforter my all in all, here in the love of Christ I stand.

May you know the God of hope and peace, our refuge and strength in the coming days.

Bishop's Letter

'It takes the whole world to know Christ'

Do you think a fish knows that it's swimming in water? I've been reflecting on this question not because it's some kind of Buddhist koan – the type of question that asks, 'What's the sound of one hand clapping?' Rather it's because I've been reflecting recently on questions of culture and world view. Do I see the world purely from the perspective of being who I am? (A 55-year-old white Englishman who grew up in a small village in the 1970s.) If that's the case, is what I see an accurate representation of the whole of reality? Might other perspectives be possible? If I could see the world through the eyes of others, might my vision be richer, wider, deeper? Like a fish that suddenly realizes that seeing can happen not only through water, but through air as well?

Seeing things from the perspective of others was something that Jesus did. An example of this happens when Jesus heals a centurion's servant in Luke's Gospel (Luke 7: 1-10). The centurion comes from a background and culture that's entirely different to that in which Jesus grew up. Yet Jesus is blown away by the insight that the centurion has about who Jesus himself is. This leads Jesus to exclaim 'I tell you, not even in Israel have I found such faith!'

The Diocese of Bath and Wells has a link with the five Anglican Dioceses of Zambia. There's much to be celebrated in the friendship that we share: the joy and vitality of the Zambian Church, the opportunities our link offers to help some of the world's poorest communities. But for me, the greatest gift we gain is the opportunity our link offers to stand in the shoes of others and to see the world, our faith, and the whole of reality from a different perspective.

A wise person once said to me 'It takes the whole world to know Christ'. Our link with Zambia enables us to see more of the Jesus we share than we could ever hope to experience otherwise.

My Faith Journey

I grew up in a Christian family, and we all went to church regularly. My dad was very involved with the Church being a churchwarden for 30 years and so I can't ever remember Church not being a significant part of my life growing up. When I went to teacher training college however, I didn't really connect with any other Christians, and I stopped going to Church. It felt like there was too many other more important things to be doing. Then I left college and went into the Navy and very quickly I was called upon to play at various church services and so I started going to church again at this point. If anyone had asked me I would have said I was a Christian, but I think I would have struggled to say what that meant apart from believing in God and going to Church fairly regularly. When I left the Navy, we came home to live in Street and I started going regularly to church with Joe and my mum and dad. I had taken Joe to church since he was born because I wanted him to have the same Church upbringing that I had had. I'm not guite sure why, but it just felt like the right thing to do. Often I would leave services in tears and not understand why I was so upset and so disturbed by what I was hearing in the sermons the rector of the time was saying. One day I had a chat with him and he suggested I go on the upcoming alpha course. I realised on the Alpha course that I had never really explored my Christian faith in any great depth and certainly when the leader was talking about a relationship with Jesus, I just didn't know what he meant, but I knew that I wanted it. One part of the course was about forgiveness and although hugely painful I realised that this was the pain I had been carrying and had to allow the Lord to deal with. So for me the Alpha course was lifechanging. Following Alpha I joined a housegroup and my faith grew from strength to strength. Close Christian friends and going on courses to develop my faith have all hugely contributed to where I am now. Through thick and thin Jesus was my everything and I knew I could rely on Him to guide me every step of the way. When I've got things wrong, He has gently brought me back to the right path but over the years I have learned to listen, trust and be obedient. The biggest question I aways have now is how to people do life with Jesus???

To make a prayer request is simple and don't wait until you feel overwhelmed – just get in touch with me and provide an outline of what you need prayer for.



Rewilding or Protecting and Restoring Nature?

The earth is the Lord's and everything in it (Psalm 24, verse 1)

The term rewilding is widely used but what does it mean and what relevance does it have to us as Christians?

Scotland

I recently visited an estate in Scotland, Alladale which is 23,000 acres (approx. 36 square miles). It is 'owned' by someone who wants the estate to be managed in an environmentally responsible way. As well as enjoying the wildlife and the glorious autumn colours I learnt about what this meant. Already a million native trees have been planted, land has been fenced to keep the deer away until the trees have grown to a sufficient height. The deer population is being reduced. More tree planting is planned especially along the riverbanks to provide shade for salmon who are adversely affected by higher temperatures. This will also boost biodiversity and carbon storage while rejuvenating the ecosystems. Whilst some call this rewilding, others point out that this is already a wild landscape and prefer what they are doing as protecting and restoring nature and landscape, regarding those responsible for the estate as custodians not owners. Genesis refers to stewardship which is about taking good care of what has been entrusted to us. This means looking after the land for nature, climate and people.

Canada

A Rocha who run the Eco Church scheme are a Christian charity who manage environmental projects around the world. One of these, in Canada, faced an issue with beaver dams. The dams were welcomed as they provided ways of storing water but also prevented salmon from swimming upstream to spawn. A post from A Rocha explains:

Although humans can, and often do, create immense damage in an ecosystem, we can also be a source of healing. Droughts exacerbated by climate change are an increasingly common occurrence, and in some cases, species struggle against one another for habitat. Through careful management, we can create a healthy home for all the creatures who live in

the Buck Creek Watershed. To protect both the salmon and the beavers, an effective compromise is to create an opening in the dam that the salmon can swim through while leaving the base intact.

England

Throughout the UK how we manage green spaces in urban and rural areas is a much-debated topic. When we think of land owned by the Church, we usually think of churchyards but these are just the tip of the iceberg. The Church of England is one of the top ten landowners in the country owning 200,000 acres (over six times the size of Allladale).

Wild Card https://wildcard.land/ is a campaign to persuade landowners, including the Church of England, to manage their land more responsibly. They say:

Whilst most churchyards are lovingly tended for nature's benefit by local congregations, half the Church's land is managed by ... the Church Commissioners. ... most of this land is in a dire ecological state with just 4% tree coverage and less than half of their protected sites in a favourable condition. It's now time for the Church Commissioners to set large-scale rewilding targets that match the spiritual calling of the Church.

They ask that Church Commissioner Rewild 30% of their English land by 2030, in support of this they have published '95 Wild Theses', statements from a wide range of people leading with **Dr Rowan Williams** Former Archbishop of Canterbury:

God saw that it was good. Do we? Letting the natural world be itself – not just a reserve bank for our convenience – is an act of grace, and one that we should be glad to embrace, because when the world around us flourishes, so do we. The material life in the midst of which we live is the neighbour we must learn to love – and love for itself.

Many people are taking action to protect and restore nature, we should support them and encourage others to do more.

An update on Street finances

A number of people have asked for an update on the current situation with Street parish finances, following our presentation to the Parish and Mission Churches over the summer.

Details of what individuals give are rightly never shared with me as Rector, but I do understand from Sonia, our treasurer that there has been a response to that appeal and that, consequently, our financial position is gradually improving. However, at our September Parochial Church Council (PCC) meeting, the improvement was not yet sufficient for us to avoid having those

difficult conversations about cutting expenditure we outlined in the summer. As it stood, we were still facing the situation that we would run out of money within the next few months, albeit increases in giving meant that would not now happen quite so quickly.

Accordingly, with a heavy heart, the PCC felt it had no choice but to suspend payment of our tithe to our mission partners this year. In addition, we are taking active steps to reduce heating costs in both of our buildings, and you may notice the impact on the temperatures in our churches over the coming weeks.

I can assure you that this was not a decision that the PCC either wanted to take or took lightly, but we had little choice as stewards of church finances with a legal responsibility to manage them well. The PCC is due to meet again at the end of November and, at that time, we will carefully review our updated financial position and future budget projections. My hope and prayer remains that the decisions we made in September are ones we will soon be able to reverse. Indeed, I am sure we would all far rather be talking in the future about new ministry and mission initiatives, because our finances were now in a sufficiently healthy state that we can consider investing further in growing God's Kingdom in this place.

'CHRIST HAS SET US FREE ... SO TAKE YOUR STAND!' Galatians 5:1 TM

On top off the Capitol dome in Washington, D.C., is a 20foot statue of the 'Freedom Lady'. Her face is framed in a crest of stars and she's holding a shield of stars and stripes in her hand. She was shipped from Rome and during a fierce storm the captain ordered some cargo to be thrown overboard. The sailors wanted to ditch the 'Freedom Lady', but the captain refused, shouting above the wind, 'Never! We'll flounder before we throw freedom away!' Ben Franklin said, 'Those who give up liberty for safety deserve neither liberty nor safety!' A wise man once said, 'If we value anything more than freedom, we'll lose our freedom. And if we value comfort or money more, we'll lose those too.' In 1945 Martin Niemoeller said, 'When the Nazis came for the Communists I didn't speak up, because I wasn't a Communist. When they came for the Jews I didn't speak up because I wasn't a Jew. When they came for the Trade Unionists I didn't speak up, because I wasn't a Trade Unionist. When they came for the Catholics I didn't speak up, because I was a Protestant. When they came for me, there was no longer anyone who could protest.'

We must guard against apathy, and never forget that much of the world doesn't enjoy the political and religious freedoms we take for granted. Remember, 'Christ has set us free ... So take your stand! Never again let anyone put a harness ... on you.'
