What has the UK inflation rate got to do with church life?

You may have seen headlines over the summer, reporting that UK inflation reached 3.6% per year, the highest rate for over 18 months. You might be wondering, however, what this has got to do with church and why we mention it in a church magazine?

The simple reality is that inflation affects all of us, including the church. Just as prices rise for our personal shopping and other bills, so prices also rise for the church, be that for heat and light or insurance, or even the cost of buying communion wine and wafers.

In response, we need to increase our income in order to balance our books, and we therefore regularly ask church members to review and increase their giving. The good news is that, whilst inflation has increased, so have incomes, even if it does not always feel like it! Government figures also show both average earnings (5%) and the state pension (4.1%) have increased more than inflation.

In the light of this, could you increase your giving to help the church cover rising costs? It's easy to put things like this off and then find that you have not changed your giving for many years. Maybe, if so, this article is your prompt to take action? If you do sometimes forget and you want an easier way to review your giving regularly, please consider joining the Parish Giving Scheme. This scheme gives an option to increase your giving each year automatically, in line with the rate of inflation, although you always have the option to opt out of any increase before it is applied.

Healing Ministry

From the Acts of the Apostles, Paul's letters and the life of the early churches, healing groups were clearly evident. These were people who responded to God's call and Jesus' promises as he talked about the kingdom of God. These were not 'extraordinary' Christians, rather those who saw God's vision of healing for a broken world and agreed and allowed God's healing power to flow through them. In October we can celebrate the beginning of healing teams at both the Parish and Mission churches. Members of our church have come forward and are completing the Acorn Trusts' course preparing them for this ministry. We can thank God for their service and their openness as they seek to serve God in our churches and beyond.

How with this unfold? From October, on the second Sunday of the month at the Mission Church, members of the healing team will be available to people for prayer. This can be for prayer for themselves or others. It will be discreet and done sensitively in the main body of the church. This may or may not involve the laying on of hands or anointing with oil. We will be asking God to come to meet us at our point of need so that God can bring us to fullness of life and have life in all its fullness. On the third Sunday of the month another group will gather at the Parish Church. Can I ask you to pray for these people as they begin this ministry of discerning what work God has for them.

This adds to the group that already meet at Walton Church on the first Sunday of the month. This group meet and pray with those who come forward for healing. Both members of our congregation and beyond, have already celebrated with us the difference this has made for their lives. We in turn give the glory to God for all that he is doing through us.

Finally, please be aware in the conversations of which you are part that if there is a need for healing you talk about this and suggest that they might come for prayer.

We look forward to all that God will do through his grace.

My Faith Journey

I have always been along to church from birth, having been brought up by Christian parents. Sundays were always a busy day and certainly not a day of rest! There was a service in the morning followed by Sunday School in the afternoon and then a service in the evening. My gran holds a very special place in my heart as she had prayed for me every day that I would come to know the Lord. Her prayer was answered when at the age of 10 I gave my heart to the Lord after listening to the speaker at the evening service, and understanding for the first time that Jesus had died on the cross for me and wanted to come and live in my heart. I told my mum the next morning that I had asked Jesus to come into my heart and we went to see my gran and told her too. During my teenage years I found that I didn't always want to go to church and would have preferred to join my non-Christian friends who seemed to be doing more exciting things on a Sunday. I knew that this would prove to be a battle with my parents and so continued to go along to church to please them and avoid arguments. The church introduced an annual Youth Holiday and it was during these days of spending time with our youth leaders and other Christians that my faith began to grow. At the age of 16 I was baptised. I later became a Sunday School teacher, teaching 6 – 7 year old girls, which I loved. At the age of 19 I began singing in a Gospel Group called 'Born Again' with my brother and two girls from the church. We would travel all over the Birmingham area taking church services and also leading

special events. My faith continued to grow during these times. It was at one of these events that I met my husband Steve. We started going out with each other and Steve would come along to various churches with the group and often helped out with the sound system. We got engaged 6 months later and married the following year in 1981. We were blessed with our only child, a daughter, in 1983.

In 1985 we moved from Birmingham to Somerset with Steve's job, first of all living in Glastonbury and then in the year 2000 we moved to Street. We had attended Street Baptist Church for many years where we served the Lord together as Sunday School teachers, Youth Leaders and in establishing the music group, leading worship with Steve on his guitar and me playing the flute. We have always enjoyed serving the Lord within the church and I have always sought to try and encourage and pray with others on their faith journey. I really enjoyed being involved with leading a group on the Alpha Course.

About nine months ago we began to attend The Mission Church where we have now settled and my prayer is that the Lord will continue to use me as I seek to serve Him here.

What does our future hold? We do not know of course, but we pray that the Lord will guide and lead us and show us what He has planned for us wherever that may be.

The Church of England with other denominations celebrates September 1st to October 4th as the Season of Creation. This abbreviated article reflects on this year's theme of **Peace with Creation** based on Isaiah 32:14-18

The palace will be forsaken, the populous city deserted; the hill and watchtower will become dens forever, the joy of wild asses, a pasture for flocks (Isaiah 32:14).

The prophet Isaiah portrays a desolate Creation, devoid of peace due to injustice and the broken relationship between God and humankind. Devastated cities and wastelands reflect the destructive impact that human activities can have on Earth. Though God's plan for Creation is rooted in justice and peace, human sin disrupts this, leaving Creation in ruin. Isaiah vividly describes the results of human estrangement from Creation. Many human activities have contributed to the destruction of Creation. Our impact has expanded from local to global, manifesting in unsustainable lifestyles, excessive consumption, lasting pollution, and a throwaway culture.

Our Hope: Creation Will Find Peace When Justice Is Restored There is hope for a peaceful Earth. Biblically, hope is active—it involves prayer, action, and reconciling with Creation and the Creator through repentance and solidarity. Isaiah envisions a peaceful Creation where God's people live only when justice is achieved. Righteousness leads to peace and restores the land's fertility.

Creation is God's sacred gift, entrusted to our care. Christians are called to protect and nurture Creation in peace, working in partnership with others and passing this responsibility on to future generations. Churches engage globally in climate, agriculture, and biodiversity efforts, grounded in theology and a prophetic call for repentance and justice. Only through reconciliation with and genuine justice for all living beings will Creation find peace, fulfilling Isaiah's vision (32:16-18).

A Call to Action: "The Effect of Justice Will Be Peace"

God calls us to be peacemakers (Matthew 5:9). We are called to live in peace, worship the Creator, and work for a just and sustainable community that aligns with God's eternal plans. As co-workers with the Creator, we must embody peace with all of Creation. God's peace is unconditional, rooted in justice and righteousness for all people and Creation.

God declared all Creation "good." Despite the damage caused by sin (Genesis 3:17-19), biodiversity reflects generosity and abundance. The Spirit guides us to ecological conversion and a deeper understanding of our cosmic family. We must change our mindsets, embrace righteousness, and teach these values to future generations. Peace with Creation requires proactive steps. Jesus taught repentance and restorative justice. We must repair broken relationships: between humans and Earth, humans and other creatures, and humans and God.

While the challenges may seem overwhelming, Christ reminds us, "With God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26). Hope fuels action; through prayer, discernment, and commitment, we can create a foundation for change.

God's peace emerges when we work for justice, solidarity, reconciliation, and harmony with Creation. Transformation takes patience, understanding, and trust. Action can include advocacy, sustainability projects, cleaning campaigns, or education to show that caring for Creation is central to our faith. We must collaborate and build on diversity to achieve peace. Peace processes, such as reforestation, river cleaning, or building wells, can unite even divided groups.

Short term Mission in South America

I have just got back for the most incredible 5 months of my life in South America serving with a Christian mission organisation called Latin Link. I spent 2 months in Ecuador and 2 months in Colombia serving. Ecuador was amazing because we were fully thrown into the deep end; completely embedding in the community that spoke zero English and with full days of manual labour filling our schedule otherwise busy with the 5 services a week! The community were so beautifully welcoming and by then end of 2 months we fully felt like family. We built a roof for their church that previously had a tent and this proved demanding work in the 30° heat. The services we found so incredible how God and his message can defy language as, despite not understanding a lot of the service, the message and spirit were definitely conveyed. After the church roof was built, we helped out with a holiday Bible club that they were running for kids in the area. This was an incredible experience and a lot of us really discovered a passion for working with kids and the change, over just 2 weeks, was unbelievable!

After some hard goodbyes in Ecuador, we headed to Colombia and got settled in. This was a very different style of mission with multiple ministries in different places. One of our ministries was 'Mom moments': a group for young mothers with young children where we would entertain and work with the kids while the mothers got a talk on raising a child. This was in a very poor area and we really connected with them, it felt like we helped them to progress. Another ministry was a set of schools that we worked with where we headed in and helped the teachers with their lessons; practicing pronunciation and other stuff. We also led some Christian camps which were just incredible and the kids by the end were just throwing themselves in wholeheartedly. SWCD Book Group

Our most recent meeting

We met recently to discuss 'I Capture the Castle' by Dodie Smith. As often happens there were mixed reactions to the book. Not everyone had finished reading it so we did our best to avoid 'plot spoilers' in our discussions.

We revisited a book we read some time ago, 'The Salt Path', questioning whether we felt differently about it in the light of media reports about the veracity of elements of the story. Some felt it didn't greatly alter their response to the story, with an awareness that any autobiographical account is told from a personal viewpoint and may omit unfavourable details.

A book we read more recently, 'The Spire' (William Golding), has recently been serialised on Radio4; at time of writing, it is still available on BBC Sounds.

Future meetings

We agreed that we would read 'The Great Gatsby' by F. Scott Fitzgerald for our November meeting (Tuesday November 18th) and 'Small Things Like These' by Claire Keegan for our January meeting (date to be arranged). Suggestions for books that we might read in future include: 'The Poisonwood Bible' by Barbara Kingsolver, 'The Penguin Lessons' by Tom Michell and 'The Red Tent' by Anita Diamant.

The book we will be discussing at our September meeting, on **Tuesday 16th September 11am** at the Mission Church, is: 'The House at Riverton' by Kate Morton. We are a Benefice Book Group and welcome new members.

Susan Ripley (Street) What is Open the Book?



Open the Book is an exciting storytelling project where Bible stories are shared with children in a way that is fun, interactive and memorable. As invited guests in school, storytelling teams use the Open the Book programme to prepare and present a 10 to 15-minute scripted Bible story to a school assembly, involving the children as much as possible. Storytelling teams are made up of trained and safely recruited volunteers from local churches who sign up to follow the Open the Book Code of Practice.

Within Street and Walton, we share the Bible stories in Walton, Elmhurst, Hindhayes and Brookside Schools either weekly or fortnightly depending on which school. Our storytelling sessions are met with real enthusiasm from the school communities, children and adults alike. The children so enjoy dressing up and acting out the story as well as singing the action song at the end. The teachers are always very pleased to see us and are very welcoming. We feel it is a real honour to be able to share the Bible stories with the children, who probably would not hear them otherwise. As a team we support each other well with prayer, care and love.

It all started in Bedford in 1999 as a millennium project. Dave Todd recognised that children didn't know Bible stories and he yearned to change that. Dave believed that if there was a way to bring Bible stories to life for children in a way that was engaging, interactive and fun, it would make a difference. One evening, he gathered in his living room a group of Christians who had experience working with children and in schools. They didn't know why they were there. Dave unveiled a giant cutout of a lion that he had made, and asked the group, 'How are

we going to tell the story of Daniel in the Lions' Den?' Since then, Open the Book, as it became known, has grown beyond what anyone ever

imagined. There are now more than 7,500 Open the Book Storytellers who comprise more than 2,500 teams. These teams go into over 3,000 primary schools across England and Wales. This means more than 360,000 children are hearing Bible stories regularly in their school assemblies. Open the Book is also growing in another 18 countries spread across Africa, Latin America and the Middle East. How thankful we are for Dave Todd's vision, commitment and creativity in finding a way to bring Bible Stories to life for children.

In September when school returns our stories begin with Creation and journey through the familiar Old Testament stories. We end with Christmas and then in January 2026 we start with Epiphany and then the stories focus on the Life of Jesus up until Easter.

In August I was privileged to dedicate the restored clock in the tower of Montacute church. It's not just any old clock. In fact, Montacute's is amongst the oldest in the country. Built in the village in **around** 1400, the clock is so old that it is held in place by iron wedges. At the time of its construction, the nut and the bolt wouldn't be invented for another hundred years!

The Montacute clock is an artefact that seems to generate generosity. In the 1980s the clock was restored by Humphrey Hamlin, for whom it is now named. Humphrey poured time and energy into its mechanism, preventing it from being scrapped. During the last two years, heroic efforts by the people of Montacute have led to its further restoration. All this was marked last month by a whole village gathering. The community choir sang, Morris men danced, the local pub provided a hog roast, cake was dispended in huge quantities.


Montacute is a beautiful example of how generosity begets generosity. Like a chain reaction, one act of generosity, the restoration of the clock, led to another, another and another. As a result, a whole community was brought together in celebration and joy.

In his second letter to the Church in Corinth, Paul writes of the church in Macedonia that 'their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity' (2 Cor 8:2).

Having nothing, the Macedonians discovered that they could still give. In turn, their generosity enabled Paul to challenge and encourage the church in Corinth to do the same. All to help the struggling Church in Jerusalem.

As I travel around our diocese, I see this pattern of generosity begetting generosity happening in so many places. One person starts, another adds their contribution, more join in and soon we learn that together we are so much more than the sum of our parts. This is the economy of God. It's an economy that all of us are invited to join.

Don't Give Place to Pride

'OUR POWER AND ABILITY AND SUFFICIENCY ARE FROM GOD.' 2 Corinthians 3:5 AMPC

Before his 1971 fight with Joe Frazier, Muhammad Ali said: 'There's not a man alive who can whup me. [He jabbed at the air with his blinding left.] I'm too smart. [He tapped his head with his glove.] I'm too pretty. [He showed the cameras his profile, like a bust on a pedestal.] I am the greatest! I am the king! I should be a postage stamp – that's the only way I'll ever get licked!' Guess what happened in that fight? To the amazement of all, especially himself, Ali lost to Frazier. When confidence in your own ability and resources becomes pride, and then becomes arrogance, you're heading for trouble. The Bible says, 'Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall' (Proverbs 16:18 NKJV).

So, how do you find balance? By remembering that every gift, ability, talent, and resource that you have comes from God. Confidence is essential to success. There is nothing wrong with recognising the gifts God has given you. But the difference between self-confidence and Christ confidence is found in who gets the credit. A good way to keep this thought in the forefront of your life is to practise the art of thanksgiving each day. It's hard to be too self-confident when you acknowledge that you are nothing without God's grace, which is His unmerited, unearned, undeserved favour. The Bible says: 'All of you be submissive to one another, and be clothed with humility, for "God resists the proud, but gives grace to the humble." Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time' (1 Peter 5:5-6 NKJV).
